



1. The goal of the course is to introduce students to the world discourse of the current debate of the social sciences on key social issues and global development, the latest results of comparative research; to improve the skills of academic discussion and presentation in English, to focus on the possibilities of comparative analysis of social problems in different societies with further use in their own research work.

2. Preliminary requirements for the course:

1. to know English at level B1 (intermediate level), theoretical foundations of sociology, modern sociological research projects, sociological approach to the analysis of social phenomena, terminology, conceptual framework and foundations of modern sociological theory and research.
2. to be able to work with sociological data, read professional sociological publications and formulate ideas in English
3. to have the skills to search and select relevant information in English, the use of methodologies and conceptual foundations of sociological analysis; discuss, present and discuss their own position on the chosen topical issue

3. Annotation of the course: The content of the course focuses on the key challenges of modern sociology (multiparadigm and the challenges of "methodological nationalism", quantitative and qualitative methodologies), on the one hand, and, on the other hand, open to discuss the most important issues of sociological international comparative research, globalization and global development. The work focuses on the analysis and discussion of recent publications in English-language sociological peer-reviewed journals in order to include students in the most relevant agenda of academic debates based on the latest research results. The format of the work is a colloquium, which combines discussion, lectures, practical tasks, is adequate for master's students. Teaching and learning in English is aimed to strengthen the professional language skills of students, to enrich their professional academic vocabulary in sociological terminology, to improve academic skills of writing abstracts, skills of presentation and debates.

4. Tasks (training objectives):

- To study the core issues in current societies within the framework of international advanced sociological debates (through the analysis of the major papers presentations at Congresses of the International Sociological Association)
- To work with the key methods of sociological analysis of the social problems of globalization and global development
- to improve qualifications in searching, selecting, analyzing and developing sources and ideas for MA research through review of the latest publications in peer-reviewed international sociological journals in English.
- to improve academic discussion and presentation skills in English, comparative analysis of social problems in different societies.

That is aimed at the development of the following competencies:

**7.2 Evaluation organization:**

1. Participation in workshops' discussions, debates in class – several forms of individual and group work in classes on the basis of analysis of read materials, 1-12 topics.
2. Final paper – topics 3-6, presentation on the topic within the framework of the master's dissertation on the basis of analysis of five articles in English (published in peer-reviewed journals).
3. Control works (video outline analysis (300 words), commented bibliography, tests) – after topics 3 and 12.
4. Written assignment – after topic 9.
